# **Copper River In-Season Salmon Teleconference**

## **Meeting Purpose**

The teleconference brings together fisheries biologists, resource managers, and subsistence users to share updates on current salmon run conditions, fishery operations, and community harvest observations across the Copper River drainage.

### **Welcome and Introductions**

- Deanna Kosbruk opened the meeting and welcomed participants.
- Amber Cohen (NPS, standing in for Barbara) introduced herself and reviewed meeting protocols: respect, muting when not speaking, and proper introductions before giving updates.
- Introductions were made by team members, including biologists and fisheries managers.

## **Fisheries Updates**

### ADF&G - Tracy Hansen

- Reported 518,000 sockeye salmon counted, exceeding the expected count by 140,000.
- King salmon run is weak. Resulting actions:
  - Sport and personal use restrictions in place.
  - Further restrictions may follow based on recapture data.
- Updates on operations:
  - Gulkana Tower is operational.

The Sockeye telemetry project is ongoing.

## ADF&G Commercial – Jeremy Botz

- Commercial fishing is **slow** but is anticipated to improve.
- Recent commercial harvest includes approximately:
  - 45,000 sockeye
  - o 260 king salmon

## National Park Service Update - Amber Cohen

- Issued:
  - o **254 permits** (Glennallen Subdistrict)
  - 204 permits (Chitina Subdistrict)
- Acknowledged team effort to manage permits and fisheries in the interim.

## 4. Weir and Research Updates

#### Tonada Creek Weir - Dan Gorze

- The weir is **operational**, despite minor issues (e.g., tree fall).
  - Resolved and no damages
- Technology upgrades in progress.

#### Prince William Sound Science Center - Pete Rand

- Discussed planned research proposals for Upper Copper River.
- Mentioned upcoming NOAA proposals for the Alaska Sustainable Salmon Fund.
- Emphasized the need for subsistence user input in shaping research direction.

### **Subsistence and Personal Use Fishing Reports**

## NPS Sampling - Mia Bobowski & Bella Ranck (via Kelsey Stanbro)

- Bella reported:
  - o Good sockeye salmon health.
  - Some king salmon in catches.
  - o Fishing is challenged by high water and debris.

• Dip netting from boats raised as a concern.

## **Chief Gary Harrison (Chickaloon)**

- Expressed concerns about:
  - Low king salmon numbers.
  - o Frequency of teleconferences and the need for broader engagement.

## **Subsistence User Reports from Various Areas**

- Karen Linnell (Chistochina Area):
  - o Noted slow fishing and difficult conditions due to water levels and debris.
  - o Raised concern over **dip netting from boats** affecting access.
- Deanna (Gulkana):
  - o Similar issues with high water and debris affecting access and harvests.

#### **Outreach and Communication Efforts**

- Amber Cohen asked about efforts to raise awareness of teleconferences.
- Deanna Kosbruk reported:
  - o Radio ads will be airing twice a week.
  - o Social media posts and flyer distribution at local stores.
- Bailey Roberts to create Fish Tech business cards with teleconference info.
