Welcome and Introductions

 Deanna Kosbruk opened the meeting, introducing its purpose: to provide a forum for fisheries managers, biologists, and subsistence users to share updates and in-season observations.

Ground Rules and Meeting Format

- Barbara Cellarius reviewed ground rules:
 - Mute when not speaking
 - Be respectful
 - Wait for turns to speak
- Noted that meeting summaries are posted on the AITRC website.

Fisheries Updates

Alaska Department of Fish & Game (ADF&G) – Jeremy Botz- Cordova

- Cumulative commercial harvest:
 - o Sockeye: 800,000
 - o Chinook: 5,465
- Noted overall strong salmon passage despite reduced participation.
- Limited subsistence fishing reported this season.

ADF&G - Tracy Hansen- Glennallen

- Anticipated sustainable escapement goal for Sockeye: 620,000–670,000.
- Sonar data updates and catch rates discussed.
 - o Numbers at the sonar are at the lower escapement goal.
- Gulkana River restrictions remain in place for King Salmon sport fishing.

Subsistence Reports

Native Village of Eyak (NVE) – Matt Piché

- Chinook migration showed delayed travel due to low water.
- Noted increased activity in lower river due to exposed gravel bars in the beginning of the season.

AITRC – Dan (Fisheries Biologist)

- Tonada Creek weir operations are going well despite water level challenges.
- Successful fish counts were recorded.

AITRC Fish Technicians – Bella Ranck & Mia Bobowski

- Observed increased catches at the Chitina wheels.
- Changing water levels contributed to variability in catches.

Wrangell-St. Elias NPS – Barbara Cellarius

- Federal subsistence permits are being transitioned into the fall hunting season.
- Shared report of a subsistence user catching 60 fish in 12 hours in Chitina.
- Slana area users faced access and equipment challenges with fish wheels.

Community and Cultural Observations

Jim Simon

- Shared visit to Karen Linnell's traditional fish camp.
- Emphasized the importance of traditional knowledge in resource management.
- Expressed concern over regional impacts of low fish numbers.

Deanna Kosbruk

- Stressed the importance of youth involvement in fisheries conservation.
 - Kelsey and her techs brought along two youth to get the experience, learn how to sample, and what they're sampling for.
- Announced final in-season teleconference scheduled for August 28 at Tazlina Community Hall.
 - o Partners were encouraged to present any wrap-ups from their season if they'd like to let Deanna know.

Collaborative Projects

- Jim Simon will reach out to Matt Piché regarding the salmon health assessment project expansion.
- Interest expressed in cross-region data collaboration on Chinook and Sockeye health.
